Mountain View Elementary is bringing the Young Americans to Kenai on March 27, 28, and 29, 2017. This will be a once in a lifetime participatory performance arts opportunity for 3rd through 12th grade children, as well as a world class singing and dancing performance by a cast of international young adults for our community.

The intermediate wing and gym of our school will effectively become a performing arts institute for 3 days as the cast of 28 Young Americans bring a hi-energy comprehensive performance workshop covering everything from vocal techniques, dance, and comedy improvisation, to stage movement, sound lighting and more. A final show will take place at the KCHS Auditorium on the evening of the final day of the workshop. Learning a show in 3 days helps students learn to work together, to respect each other's strengths and to discover their own potential. The final performance will consist of two acts, one by the Young Americans and one with the Young Americans alongside the student workshop participants. Tickets will be sold for this show and the public is invited.

We have committed to raising the funds to ensure that all Mountain View 3rd-5th grade students can participate regardless of their ability to pay the \$59 workshop fee. We will also be supporting parents of students in the show who may need assistance with purchasing tickets. We will be recruiting KCHS and KMS students to fill an additional 100 workshop spots.

Nurses News

Occasionally I get calls from parents who want to know if we have lice at school. With over 450 students in our school there is probably a louse on a kid somewhere in our building at any given time.

Lice are actually a lot harder to transmit than most people think. They won't jump on you and can't fly. They are very good at climbing on hair shafts but are extremely clumsy and unable to maneuver once they are not on someone's scalp. Almost all lice transmission occurs through CLOSE HAIR TO HAIR CONTACT. This occurs when kids share hats, touch heads together, and have sleepovers or share beds.

Many of us remember the days when the nurse went from room to room checking kid's heads for lice. We don't do that anymore because studies found that classroom checks are not effective in finding kids with lice. Instead teachers discreetly send children to the nurse when they are noted to be scratching their head excessively, this is the most effective way of finding children with head lice.

Today when a child is identified with lice the parent is called and requested to pick their child up from school. The student may return when there are NO LIVE LICE. Check with the nurse for lots of great resources on getting rid of lice. Students must check in with the nurse upon arriving back at school to verify the absence of head lice before going to class.

It is a good idea to check your child's hair on a weekly basis for lice and to treat them as soon as any lice are found. **Studies show that by the time the nurse finds lice on your kid they have had them for 30 days!** We will continue to do our part here to prevent transmission of lice at school. Remember, as frustrating and annoying as dealing with lice are, they are not a public health hazard and you and your child are going to be ok.
