

NURSES NEWS



Cold and Flu season has arrived. Please teach your child the importance of staying healthy. Here are some tips.

*Cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze. Cough and sneeze into your elbow!

*Wash your hands often.

*Drink lots of water.

*Dress properly for the weather. We want our students to get lots of fresh air, so we have outdoor recess when possible. Please make sure your child comes to school with proper winter gear. Also remember to send shoes to wear indoors and at gym.

When to keep your child home from school

1. Your child should not be at school if they have thrown up in the past 24 hours, or has had 2 or more episodes of diarrhea.
2. If they have a fever over 100.0F in the past 24 hours with or without medication.
3. If you feel the need to give cough medicine or pain/fever reducer in order for them to be able to come to school.

Hand, Foot and Mouth

I have received questions about Hand, Foot and Mouth. It is a common viral illness that is spread through saliva, feces, respiratory secretions and direct contact with blisters.

It is most contagious during the time the student is feeling ill and/or has open, weeping blisters.

The classic appearance of HFM is a sudden sore throat, fever, fatigue and loss of appetite. Within 1-2 days, blister like sores may appear in/around the mouth, on hands and feet.

Treatment is not usually necessary. You may desire to lessen the discomfort and pain but **DO NOT GIVE ASPIRIN**. Children should stay home from school if they have a fever of 100 degrees or higher, open weeping blisters, or any other symptoms that may cause the child not to be able to participate in the school day.

Recommendations to help prevent the spread of HFM are:

Hand washing, cover nose and mouth when coughing and sneezing, wash toys and other surfaces that may have saliva on them.
